▼ SPRING TSECHU, PARO

The Paro Tsechu is a highlight and heralds the onset of Spring in Bhutan every April. The main event is the colourful Cham Dance, a fantastic performance of dance, drama and music, with monks dressed in vivid costumes and dramatic masks!



Ladakh is known for its immense apricot orchards. In mid-April, these trees shake off their winter stupor and burst into bloom! The apricot blossom festival is a joyous event, and Ladakh celebrates it with a festival of cultural performances, handicrafts and food.



■ BUDDHA JAYANTI, KATHMANDU

Buddha Jayanti is celebrated to commemorate the birth and spiritual enlightenment of Lord Buddha in May. While the festival takes place across Nepal, Swayambhunath Stupa in Kathmandu displays an effigy of Lord Buddha's body, and thousands of pilgrims attend this celebration.

WANDERLUST IN LADAKH

LEH & PANGONG-TSO

Situated at the top of the world, Ladakh is characterized by a sense of peace and tranquility. Leh is the cultural and economic center of the region, from where one begins to explore the countryside.

A bustling city, Leh was once a royal capital and the Leh Palace is a close replica of Potala Palace in Tibet. It was an important stop on the old trade routes, particularly the Silk Road creating a cultural amalgamation that has percolated down over centuries. Stupas, mosques, monasteries and temples give it a distinct spiritual character. The historic district is a heritage site, which is included in the World Monuments Fund list.

PANGONG TSO

Icy blue waters reflect the beauty of the landscape. Calm and serene, this is the perfect place to go and indulge in a moment of quiet contemplation.

Pangong Tso means the high grassland lake. It is situated on the Indo-Tibet border, and one can often observe flocks of migratory birds flying overhead. The drive from Leh to Pangong is also very picturesque. One can either cross the high Chang-La pass, or approach it through the dramatic Nubra Valley with its gushing rivers and stark sand dunes, against the backdrop of the mountains.

WEEKEND IN GANGTOK


With stunning views of Kanchenjunga, Gangtok is a great place to base oneself while exploring Sikkim. Discover a variety of lakes, waterfalls and old world monasteries in the vicinity of the city.

The Rumtek Monastery, which is located within a short distance of the city, is well worth a visit. It has a distinct Tibetan aesthetic, and a lovely collection of old Buddhist art.

If you're a nature lover, then head over to Tsomgo Lake, surrounded by dramatic mountains. Pause for a moment at the Shiva Temple to seek a blessing before you explore this stunning landscape.

For those who enjoy hiking and biking, there are several trails that you can explore within a short distance of Gangtok itself. The best time to visit is from mid-March to mid-May, when the rhododendron is in full bloom. Sikkim is also a cradle of tribal culture and the folklore is full of great stories and incredible character. If you're interested in Tibetan culture, then the Namgyal Institute of Tibetology is worth a visit.

SHIMLA & MASHOBRA


With its bustling bazaar and old world architecture, Shimla is full of charm and colonial heritage.




